



Then they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." And they cast lots to divide his clothing. The people stood by, watching Jesus on the cross; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" THE NICENE CREED



Christmas **F**estival 2016

The annual Christmas Festival is **Saturday**, **December 3**, **from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.** We need volunteers and donations in a number of areas:

- **Soup:** Volunteers to make 10 quarts of soup. Recipes and quart containers will be provided.
- **Baked Goods:** Volunteers to make baked goods to be sold.
- **Wreaths:** Volunteers to help decorate wreaths to be sold at the Festival. Wreath decorating will take place on **Thursday evening**, **December 1 at 7 p.m.** We're collecting donations of seasonally appropriate ribbons (wired, 2" 4" wide) and decorations (they can be recycled from previous years!), such as small ornaments, bells, pinecones, silk flowers, leaves, faux fruits, etc. Old wreath bows can be fluffed up and refreshed. Fresh items from your yard (holly, laurel, grasses, evergreens) are welcome as well; please bring these on December 1 instead of dropping them off ahead of time.
- Volunteers to help with **set-up and clean-up** on Festival Day.
- **Accessories:** Go through your closets to find scarves, jewelry, hats, purses, to contribute to the Accessories Boutique.
- **Items for theme baskets**: Various church groups are putting together theme baskets, including the Vestry (Welcome to West Hartford), Women's Fellowship (spa basket), Church School (family game night), the Altar Guild (gardening), Choir ("Read to me" books for children), Ushers (coffee and tea) and Layreaders (gourmet food).
- **Gingerbread house candy decorations:** The church school is collecting small, colorful candies for gingerbread houses: round peppermints, plain Hershey's kisses, gumdrops, gummy bears, cinnamon red hots, and Skittles.

Donations for various categories, such as art and Attic Treasures, are also welcome. **Please note that we are NOT doing a book sale this year, so please do not bring used books to the church.**Donated items can be brought to the church office, clearly labeled. DID YOU KNOW? Focus on Pledging and Contributions

Pledges from parishioners, in which you commit to give a certain amount over the course of a year, is the primary way that Episcopal Churches fund our mission and ministry. Having pledge commitments allows us to create an annual budget that accurately reflects contribution income. Here are answers to the most common questions we get about pledging and contributions.

Is my pledge information confidential? Yes – with a few exceptions. The only person who has ongoing access to the amount of your annual pledge is Financial Administrator Mirella Russo, who maintains records and manages contributions. The Stewardship Committee, the rector, and the wardens reviewed the letters that went to last year's pledgers, which included last year's pledge amount. To follow cash-control procedures required by our auditors, the ushers record all cash and checks that come in through the Sunday offering plate, including opening pledge envelopes to record their contents. We will eventually publish the names of all pledgers in a Sunday bulletin, but this will not include your pledge amount. Parishioners may request that their name be left off. of this public listing by contacting the parish manager, Ellen Dollar.

How should I send in my pledge payments? You may mail your pledge payments to the church, drop them off in the office, make a payment online (see the next question, below, for details), or put a pledge payment in the Sunday offering plate. To ensure that your payment is credited to your pledge, use your numbered pledge envelope or simply write "Pledge" on the memo line of your check. Please note that the Sunday ushers do need to open envelopes that are put in the Sunday offering plate to record all checks and cash coming in. The ushers will keep all contribution information confidential. However, if you don't want the ushers to see the amount of your contributions, it's best to mail them in or make an online payment through your bank.

How do I make an online pledge payment? Our church web site has a link that allows you to make a pledge contribution through our parish database system. *However, St. John's is charged a fee for each contribution received in this way, which adds up to hundreds of dollars per year.* A better way to contribute online is to use your bank's online bill paying service. All major banks offer this service free of charge. By setting up an online banking account connected to your checking account, you can send electronic payments directly to large billing companies (such as utility or credit card companies), and you can also send check payments to charitable organizations or even an individual. You enter the name and address to whom you want to send a payment, fill in the dollar amount, and your bank will issue and mail a check—all free of charge to you and to your recipient. It's easy for everyone, free, and ensures that only the financial administrator will see your pledge payments.

How do I contribute stock? Before arranging to donate stock to St. John's, let our financial administrator know how many shares, from what company, and from whom the check will be coming (such as your brokerage firm). If you have already donated stock in 2016 and haven't contacted the financial administrator about it, please do so as soon as possible.
