An Epiphany Message from the Rector

On the twelfth night of Christmastide we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany. This marks the time when the three magi, the wise men, visited the newly born baby Jesus. For the eight Sundays of the Epiphany season, we focus on how Christ was made known to the world. The word "Epiphany" is Greek for "manifestation," the revelation of God made incarnate to the entire world in the most unlikely of ways—with the humble birth of his Son, Jesus the Christ. The Gospel of Matthew tells the story of how the three Kings—Melchior, Caspar and Balthazar—followed the star of Bethlehem across the desert to find this newborn with his mother Mary. To honor the Christ child, the magi offer their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. The gold is symbolic of Jesus's royal position, frankincense symbolizes his divine birth, and myrrh depicts his mortality. The season of Epiphany is a perfect time to be aware of how the light of Christ is present in our lives and in the world. What gifts, given to us by God, can we share to honor the Messiah, the Savior of the world, Emmanuel, God with us? How can we reflect the love of God coming into the world?

If you are with us for the first time, please make yourself comfortable. We look forward to meeting you. If you would like to learn more about the church, please fill out a card (hanging in each pew), put it in the offering plate or hand it to an usher or member of the clergy, and we will be in touch. It is our custom to be silent before the service, so as you take some time to pray, please turn off all electronic devices. Please ask the ushers for assistance with these or with any other requests. Again, welcome.

It is one of the original set of 1909 windows, and was given in memory of Nathan Morgan Waterman and Lucy Sooter Waterman by their daughter Catherine Waterman Root. The window was designed and constructed by the Harry Eldredge Goodhue Company of Boston and Cambridge.

THE EPISTLE

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength. Consider your own call, brothers and sisters: not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. My eyes for beauty pine; My soul for God's grace; No other care nor hope is mine; To heaven I turn my face; One splendour thence is shed from all the stars above; Tis named when God's name is said; Tis love, 'tis heavenly Love; And every gentle heart that burns with true desire Is lit from eyes that mirror part of that celestial fire.

Whether for voices or organ or orchestra, Herbert Howells could most certainly write grand, sweeping musical phrases. As the Youth Choir sings, note the crest of the phrase on the word "eyes" from the outset. The highest note of the first section occurs on the word "heaven" not by accident, indeed. In the middle section, not only does he write another high passage for "heavenly Love," he even slows down the tempo and harmonic rhythm to make sure we pay close attention to the use of "Love" (capitalized) as an equivalent name for God. He then uses similar tempo and rhythm techniques with the words "celestial fire" at the end with similar sublime effectiveness. (*Notes courtesy David Perry Ouzts*)

Wes Winterbottom — A lifelong Episcopalian, Wes grew up attending Grace Episcopal Church in Whitestone, N.Y., where he was active in the church choir, acolytes, Young People's Fellowship, and the Boy Scout troop, where he attained the rank of Eagle Scout. He enjoyed many summers at Incarnation Camp in Ivoryton, CT, first as a camper and then as a counselor leading canoe and hiking trips. A resident of West Hartford since 1978, Wes was a member of St. James's Episcopal Church for many years while his three children were young; he taught Sunday School and helped found and

grow the Healing Prayers Ministry. A member of St. John's for almost 10 years, Wes has served on the Vestry for last two years and as chaplain of the Recruitment Committee that recommended hiring the Reverend Susan Pinkerton. Additionally, he currently serves as a layreader, usher, member of the Global Missions Committee, and chair of the Healing Prayers Ministry. Wes holds a bachelor's degree in civil engineering from Lehigh University, a master's degree in environmental engineering from Cornell University, and an MBA in finance and management from the University of Connecticut.
