

An Easter Message from the Rector

During Holy Week we walked with Jesus as he made his way to Jerusalem for the last time. We shared a last supper and washed one another's feet as Jesus showed us what it means to love and serve others. Along with Mary his mother, and Mary Magdalene, one of his inner circle, we stood at the foot of the cross and witnessed Jesus's agonizing death. We know too well the sting of death as we kept watch at Jesus' tomb. But, as Christians, we know there is more. This Easter we sing our "Alleluias" as testimony to the world that love, not death, has the last say. For the 50 days of Eastertide we celebrate the Resurrection of Christ as we live into our calling to be the living body of Christ in the world. Life and love, not death and despair, have the last word. Together we celebrate the good news that death has been defeated once and for all as we join our voices, singing, "Alleluia! Christ is risen. Christ is risen, indeed!"

THE FIRST LESSON

Acts 1: 6-14

All sit.

Then the apostles had come together, they asked Jesus, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of

their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven." Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath day's journey away. When they had entered the city, they went to the room upstairs where they were staying, Peter, and John, and James, and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James son of Alphaeus, and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer, together with certain women, including Mary the mother of Jesus, as well as his brothers.

THE SERMON The Rev. Hope Eakins

THE NICENE CREED

All stand.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Holy and compassionate God, open our eyes to see your presence revealed around us in communities transformed by justice and compassion, in the healing of all that is broken, and in the hope of the poor. Give us the will to follow your risen Son and call upon you in trust.

Guide and uphold your Church, O Lord, so that in times of prosperity we may not lose our zeal, and in times of adversity, we may not lose our faith. We ask your blessing on the people and missions of St. John's Parish. Merciful God, **strengthen us.**

Make us grateful, O Lord, for the gift of your Son Jesus and make us also grateful for those who bless your name in faiths and words that are not ours. Free us from arrogance and pride, to be one people in common need of your mercy. Merciful God, **enlarge our hearts.**

Pour your grace upon the leaders of the nations; give them a spirit of cooperation and guide them into the ways of peace. Protect the people of Syria and the United Nations peacekeepers in their midst. Merciful God, **give our leaders wisdom.**

Draw members of all points of view together in your Spirit that we may be thankful for our different gifts and perspectives. Bless all public officials with the grace to work more for progress than for personal gain. Merciful God, **make us a united people**.

Comfort and restore those wounded in body and heart by the Manchester terrorist attack. Heal those weighed down by despair, suffering from addictions, and burdened by illness, especially those we name now [pause for spoken or silent prayers]. Fill them with your lifegiving power and love. Merciful God, comfort and heal those who suffer.

We give you thanks for the signs of growth in the world around us, for gardens springing from the earth, for graduates of schools and colleges, for artists and writers and music makers, for those who care for our fragile earth. Merciful God, make us good stewards of your bounty.

We give you thanks for those who have gone before us and rest in life everlasting, especially Bill Faude, Nathan-Edward Weidner Miller, Carol Montas, Wende Taylor, and those we now name [pause for silent or spoken prayers]. Merciful God, give them eternal peace.

Celebrant Receive these prayers, O God, and transform us through them; forgive us our sins and give us

grace to amend our lives, that we may serve you with all our heart and mind and strength.

God is gone up with a merry noise, and the Lord with the sound of the trumpet. The Lord is among them as in the holy place of Sinai; he is gone up on high, he hath led captivity captive. Alleluia!

American composer Ned Rorem composed the first of his Seven Motets for the Church Year in 1977 on a commission from Christ Church Cathedral, Trinity and St. James's in Hartford/West Hartford. The cycle was completed in 1986 for the 75th anniversary of All Saints Episcopal Church in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. This fifth movement is a joyous acclamation of the belief in Jesus's ascent into heaven.



All remain standing or kneel.

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

In my heart's sequestered chambers lie truths stripped of poet's gloss. Words alone are vain and vacant, and my heart is mute. In response to aching silence memory summons half-heard voices, And my soul finds primal eloquence and wraps me in song.

If you would comfort me, sing me a lullaby. If you would win my heart, sing me a love song. If you would mourn me and bring me to God, Sing me a requiem, sing me to heaven.

Touch in me all love and passion, pain and pleasure, Touch in me grief and comfort; love and passion, Pain and pleasure.

Sing me a lullaby, a love song, a requiem, Love me, comfort me, bring me to God: Sing me a love song, sing me to heaven.

Sing me to heaven is perhaps the most written about choral work of the 20th century, as many different meanings can be derived from the beautiful text. Composed by American Dan Gawthrop, he says of its commission: "The director said she wanted something which speaks to the way that we, as singers, feel about music in our lives." Choral director Dan Wagner sums it up best: "I believe the Sing me to heaven text is really about music's ability best express life's deepest mysteries, greatest joys, and deepest sorrows. It is an ode to musical mysticism, in my opinion. I listen to it and am moved from my own point of view. My personal life experience — too much talking, not enough music! — leads me to affirm this piece and its text...when I die, I hope there's more singing than talking!"
